- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: Luke 22.
  - B. Failure can be a catalyst for something great if we respond correctly.
- II. Satan looks for opportunities to cause us to fail.
  - A. Satan's goal is to dislodge our faith rendering us useless for God.
  - B. Satan asks for permission to attack those believers with potential because he fears the damage they will do to his kingdom of darkness.
  - C. Christ knows our failures ahead of times, so He has no expectations of us.
    - 1. He knows our failures and weakness.
    - 2. Satan often attacks us in our areas of strength because our guard is down in those areas.
- III. Jesus allowed Peter to fail but not to be sifted.
  - A. God lets us fail, but God does not cause us to fail—we make the choice.
  - B. God did not save us based on conduct but our response to grace.
  - C. Is your life making enough of an impact that it is worth God and Satan discussing?
- IV. Our failures are the objects of Christ's prayers.
  - A. He prayed that Peter's faith would not fail even though his courage failed.
  - B. We should see failure as an isolated event so that we respond appropriately to it.
  - C. Jesus is not praying that we do not sin but that we have help in our failure. (Hebrews 7, Romans 8:26)
  - D. The final choice of obedience is left to us.
  - E. We need to see Jesus as our friend—one who does not condone sin, but one who does not forsake us when we do sin.
- V. Our failures can prepare us for our greatest service before God.
  - A. If God is going to use us to our maximum potential we must be broken.

B. Peter's problem was pride, selfishness, an independent spirit and disloyalty.
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- C. God had to deal with all of this to prepare Peter.
- D. We must respond appropriately to these times of failure.
