- II. Questions and answers to get started with witnessing.
  - A. "What is your name? Where are you from?" This is a natural way to start.
  - B. "What is your line of work or course of study?"
  - C. Be general when talking about your area of ministry.
  - D. "What religion is your parents?" Point out that a person usually adopts the religion of their parents.
  - E. "What is your religious background?"
  - F. "Were you raised in your religious background, or did you convert recently?"
  - G. "Did you regularly attend the church you grew up in?"
  - H. "Did you feel like you came to a personal relationship to the Lord going to this church?"
  - I. "What is the real purpose of life?"
- III. The "Real Purpose of Life" tract.
  - A. It is evident that science does not offer a real purpose for life.
  - B. God created man with a capacity to have fellowship with Himself and a will and ability to choose. (Genesis 1:27)
  - C. Man is separated from God because of the fall in the Garden of Eden. Separation from God is spiritual death.
  - D. Man chose to disobey God—he deliberately failed to be what God wanted him to be.
  - E. The absence of life is death—the wages of sin is death. Man was born with and is condemned already. (Ephesians 2:8-9, John 3:18)
  - F. God creates a bridge between man and Himself through the death of Jesus Christ on the cross. (I Peter 3:18)
  - G. Anyone who receives Jesus will receive eternal life. (John 1:12)
  - H. If a person invites Jesus into his life, he is inviting Jesus to change his life. (II Corinthians 5:14)
