Sovereignty of God Gene Warr

- I. Introduction.
 - A. The world is not out of control—God is still in control.
 - B. Sovereignty is having supreme power and authority.
- II. God's sovereignty.
 - A. God is sovereign over history. (Isaiah 14:24, 27; 46:10; 34:16; Psalm 115:3; Daniel 4:35; Ephesians 1:9-10; Philippians 2:9-10)
 - B. God is sovereign in the affairs of nations. (Acts 17:26; Daniel 4:32; Job 12:23; Jeremiah 27:9; Ezekiel 31:14; Daniel 2:20)
 - C. God is sovereign in blessing and retribution. (Galatians 6:7; Isaiah 3:10-11; Obadiah 15; Jeremiah 4:3-4; 1 Kings 8:56; Proverbs 30:5; Luke 1:37; Proverbs 13:21; Psalm 139:16; Proverbs 21:1; 16:9; 1 Samuel 2:7; Job 10:9-10; 34:15-16; Psalm 75:6-7)
 - D. God is sovereign in the affairs of men's lives. (Job 23:13-14; Proverbs 16:33)
- III. Implications and application of God's sovereignty.
 - A. The best choice is to trust God and press on.
 - B. God has limited his sovereignty in our right of choice, in a decision for Jesus Christ and daily obedience. God limited deity in Jesus. (Philippians 2; Hebrews 5:8; 2:10)
 - C. Application.
 - 1. If God is really sovereign, do not fear the future. Grace is sufficient at the point of need. (Matthew 6:34)
 - 2. Do not live in the past. (Isaiah 43:18)
 - 3. Do not panic: God is sovereign, all-powerful (Matthew 28:18), all-knowing (Hebrews 4:13) and he loves us (John 13:1).
