- A. Text: Hebrews.
- B. Jesus was always extending his love, but reminding the people that there is a limit. (John 12:32; 8:12; 7:33; Genesis 5:3; Isaiah 63:7-10)
- C. God's mercy has limits.
- D. Hebrews warns about people who are close to committing themselves to Christ but never do.
- II. The first warning passage: the church was primitive although it should have been advanced.. (Hebrews 2:1-4)
- III. The second warning: there was certain judgment for those who had only tasted but had not committed to the Holy Spirit.
- IV. The second warning passage: if a person willfully rejects Christ knowing the truth, there is no other sacrifice.
- V. The fourth warning: God is a consuming fire who will shake the very heavens in his judgment. (Hebrews 12)
- VI. The fifth warning: do not go another day rejecting Jesus and harden yourselves. (Hebrews 3-4)
 - A. It would be fearful knowing that God had given the promise of rest and one did not attain it.
 - B. The basis of rest: one has to hear the gospel and mix it with faith. (Numbers 14)
 - C. God will always preserve a remnant.
 - D. There is still a rest for the people of God.
 - E. We do not enter by works.
