 - B. Caleb lived his life completely before God and not according to the pressures around him. (Joshua 14)
 - 1. Caleb was faithful in helping others, but he did not ask for anything special for himself aside from what the Lord would provide.
 - 2. Caleb did not rely on any special help in the battle in his old age only the opportunity
 - because he was a man with different Spirit.
