Holiness

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- I. Introduction.
 - A. God has called every Christian to a holy life. (1 Peter 1:15-16)
 - B. Holiness is conformity to the moral character of God.
- II. The importance of holiness.
 - A. Without holiness, no one will see God. (Hebrews 12:14; Titus 2:11-12)
 - B. God hates sin.
- III. God's provision for holiness.
 - A. There is a kingdom of darkness and a kingdom of light. Through Jesus we have been rescued from the first for the second. (Romans 6:11-12; Acts 20:18; Colossians 1:13; Ephesians 2:1)
 - B. We have become spiritually united to Christ. (John 15; 2 Corinthians 5:14; Galatians 2:20)
 - C. Deliverance from the kingdom of sin does not mean that we are no longer influenced by sin. (Colossians 1:13)
 - D. Implications of being alive to God.
 - 1. We are united to Christ and all of his power. (Philippians 4:13)
 - 2. The Spirit of God has been given to us to make us holy.
 - a. He causes us to begin to see our sin. (Jeremiah 17:9)
 - b. He awakens in us a desire to be holy. (Philippians 2:13)
 - c. He gives us power to say no to sin.
- IV. Our responsibility for holiness.
 - A. We must both trust and work to put to death the sinful deeds of the body. (Romans 8:13)
 - B. We should not polarize faith and obedience.
 - C. Paul learned to be content—he did not just believe for it. (Philippians 4:13)
- V. What we must do.
 - A. We must commit ourselves to a life of holiness without exception. (1 John 2:1)
 - B. We must take all sin seriously. (Song of Solomon 2:15; Luke 16:10)

- C. We must take a God-centered view of sin rather than a self-centered view of sin.
- D. We must be willing to exercise discipline, which is structured living. (1 Timothy 4:7; 2 Timothy 3:16)
- E. We must know that all training is at first characterized by failure. (Proverbs 24:16)
