- A. Text: Matthew 8.
- B. More is done when people are members of a team.
- C. Jesus was moved to compassion when He saw people moving about as sheep without a shepherd. (Numbers 27:15-16, I Peter 5:2-3)
- D. The job of leadership is to serve. (II Corinthians 1:24, Matthew 23:6-12)
- E. The Lord seeks a dear gang—people who witness on their own. This is what the Lord seeks when He asks us to pray for laborers of the harvest.
- II. The Lord built a core of men who were solid at the center. (Matthew 10:1, Philippians 2:25)
 - A. Men are selected out of a group.
 - B. One of the basic philosophies of the Navigator movement is working with a band of men.
 - C. They try to find faithful, teachable men and work with them at the basic level.
 - D. Do not be in too much of a hurry to ordain a man so that you do not have to take responsibility for a man. (I Corinthians 1:21)
- III. Characteristics of "good seed."
 - A. Good seed has Christ life. (John 15:5)
 - B. It must be sown in the field by Christ.
 - C. You have to plant good seed from the nucleus.
 - D. Good seed can reproduce.
 - E. Good seed must die to reproduce—we can trade our life for thousands of men. (I John 4:16, Isaiah 43:4)
 - F. Three marks to look for in a disciple: Does he have a heart for God? Is he willing to pay the price? Is he teachable?
 - G. Opposition will come, so the disciple is to have the right attitude toward opposition.
 - H. The disciple himself must be out in the battle.
