I. Introduction.

- A. Everybody has a system of belief by which they operate. The challenge for us is bringing our system of belief in line with the Scriptures.
- B. We can use Scripture knowledge to become proud and argumentative or to grow in a more godly life. (1 Corinthians 8:1; Titus 1:1)
- C. Spiritual transformation is normally called sanctification. Justification will always be accompanied by sanctification. Justification means that we have been declared righteous in God's sight.
- D. Sanctification is Christian growth that is continual over a life time.
- A. To sanctify means to set apart.
- II. Definitive sanctification is the Holy Spirit acting alone to set us apart for God. (1 Corinthians 6:19; Ezekiel 36:26-27)
 - A. We are righteous in our standing before God, we are sanctified in our state before God and we are children in our status before God.
 - 1. Our standing is based on Christ's performance.
 - 2. Our state has changed in Christ because we have been bought with a price.
 - 3. Our state is different because we have been given a new heart.
- III. We should never evaluate our acceptance before God on the basis of our performance.
 - A. It is based on the performance of Christ.
 - B. It should motivate us towards personal righteousness.
- IV. Progressive sanctification.
 - A. Transformation is a good term for sanctification.
 - 1. It is Scriptural. (Romans 12:2; 2 Corinthians 3:18)
 - 2. It is more than separation from sin--it is putting on the new self. (Ephesians 4:22)
 - 3. It involves a real change from the inside out. (2 Corinthians 3:18)
 - B. We should have an agenda about spiritual transformation. (Hebrews 13:21)
 - C. The Holy Spirit shines light into our lives and causes us to see who we really are.
