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- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Isaiah 40:31.
 - B. Disillusion happens in the gap between expectation and reality.
 - C. Hope is tied with waiting on God. (Hebrews 6:19)
- II. Hope has to be rooted in something—it is an anchor.
 - A. An anchor cannot be secured if it is anchored in what a person is floating.
 - B. Hope anchors us in...
 - 1. The present from the future. The believer's future is sure.
 - 2. The earthly from the heavenly. (Hebrews 8-10, Exodus 20-40)
 - 3. The visible from the invisible. (Hebrews 11:1)
 - C. Jesus is our hope. (I Timothy 1:1)
 - 1. Jesus is our hope because He is our mediator.
 - 2. Jesus is the intersection between the realities. (John 1:14)
- III. How to anchor one's hope in God.
 - A. Hope anchors in the promises. (Hebrews 10:23, Joshua 23:14)
 - B. Hope anchors in the purposes of God. (Psalm 103:7)
 - C. Hope anchors in the Person of God. We can only trust in a God that we know. (Isaiah 30:18, Psalm 19)
- IV. Application.
 - A. Hope is an attitude of the heart. Get in the Scriptures that tell us about hope in God.
 - B. Hope is an expression of trust in God.
 - C. Hope is a source of strength.
