## The Bible and Physical Intimacy Howard Hendricks

## Introduction.

- A. Sex is an extremely ambitious subject.
- B. I feel like the boy who chose to write about the universe its origin, nature, and destiny in 500 words.
- C. We will not be exhaustive in our approach to sex.
- I. My purpose in talking of the Biblical view of sex is to give you some ammunition with which to engage your culture about what God says about sex.
  - A. The foundation of God's revelation about sex is found in Genesis.
    - 1. The first section of the creation account focuses on Elohim, the almighty who created the physical universe from nothing.
    - 2. Beginning with the creation of man the focus changes and the name of God focuses on Yahweh, the covenant keeping God. (Genesis 2:4-25)
      - a. Yahweh calls one man and one woman into relationship forever.
      - b. God created man in his own image, male and female he created them (Genesis 1:27)
      - c. Maleness and femaleness is the most distinctive thing about humans.
      - d. Our culture is maculating women and feminizing men.
      - e. If we lose our sexual identity we become perverts.
      - f. God blessed the man and the woman commanding them to be fruitful, to multiply and to rule over the earth.
      - g. God saw that his creation was good. (Genesis 1:31)
      - h. God also saw that it is not good for man to live alone (Genesis 2:18)
        - 1. In spite of the good creation it was not good for man to live alone.
        - 2. This destroys homosexuality because only a woman could answer the aloneness of a man.
        - 3. Thus, God decided to make a helper for the man who would fill up the empty spaces in his life.

- 4. Men should not marry until they realize they need the woman in question; this is the basis for a Biblical marriage.
- 5. Adam recognized that the woman was the answer to his aloneness problem.
- 6. Each partner brings into a marriage what he or she is, so being the right person is more important than finding the right person.
- B. Four principles summarize a Biblical marriage.
  - 1. Marriage and the family are of divine origin.
    - a. It takes three to make a Christian marriage.
      - 1. The Lord.
      - 2. A man.
      - 3. A woman.
    - b. The dynamic of the vertical relationship determines the dynamic of the vertical relationship.
    - a. The physical does not drive the relationship.
    - b. The spiritual determines the product of the physical relationship.
    - c. A sagging sex life can only be solved through a vibrant spiritual relationship with God.
    - d. Also if I am out of fellowship with my wife I am also out of fellowship with the Lord.
    - e. Family is the ideal, divinely structured context for sex education.
      - 1. Children should be educated in the home regarding sex.
      - 2. The average couple is poorly equipped for this, however.
      - 3. Boys get their idea of masculinity from his dad, and the dad will reproduce after his kind.
      - 4. Girls get their idea of femininity from their mothers.
      - 5. Homosexuality is a great perversion.
        - i. It is at 7 out of 100.
        - ii. In Southern California it's 22 out of 100.

- iii. Boys relate to both dads and women and need to be affirmed by both.
- iv. Women who over relate to their sons commit emotional incest.
- v. Dads who over relate to girls destroy their sexual drive.
  - a. Parents over relate to their children when they stop loving their partners.
  - b. Children need to know they are number two, not number one.
  - c. Dads need to model what it means to love their wives.
  - d. Loving couples produce healthy children.
- f. Family is also a good environment for dealing with conflict.
  - 1. Children from big families are well adjusted.
  - 2. The Lord builds a house. (Psalm 127:1)
  - 3. We need to submit our families to God.
  - 4. God gets the glory this way.
- 2. Sex is a gift of God with purpose.
  - a. Sex is not the original sin.
  - b. Pain in bearing children and submission to husbands is results of sin, but sex was in place prior to the fall. (Genesis 3:16)
  - c. There is a three-fold purpose for sex.
    - 1. Procreation. (Genesis 1:27-28; 9:1; Psalm 127)
      - a. Children are a heritage, or assignment from God.
      - b. Children minister to parents.
      - c. Children are a reward from God.
    - 2. To prevent fornication. (1 Corinthians 7:1-2)
      - a. Flaunting the standard of God is costly.
      - b. We reap what we sow.

- 3. To promote mutual love.
  - a. This is the pleasure principle.
  - b. Platonic dualism says the body is bad, either to be indulged or denied, resulting in either asceticism or promiscuity.
  - c. Puritanism is not the Biblical view of sex.
  - d. Sarah and Abraham had pleasure in sex. (Genesis 18:12)
  - e. Isaac sported with Rebekah. (Genesis 16:6-8)
  - f. A newly wed man was excused from military service and business for one year in order to please his wife. (Deuteronomy 24:5)
  - g. A man is to be satisfied by his wife's breasts. (Proverbs 5:18-19)
  - h. The Song of Solomon is all about marital sex.
- 3. One relationship must be broken before another relationship can be established. (Genesis 2:24)
  - a. Young people need to relationally abandon their parents.
  - b. Young people need to bond with their spouses.
- 4. Intimacy in marriage is a lifelong process of communication.
  - a. A man and a woman become one flesh.
  - b. This is emotional, intellectual, social, spiritual, and sexual bonding.
  - c. This is one message I hope you will never forget.
  - d. A couple in love is an effective couple.
  - e. A Christian home is the most distinctive feature in a pagan culture.
    - 1. During a recent party when we invited neighbors one man asked my son what makes our family tick.
    - 2. My son shared the Gospel with him.
    - 3. If our marriages fall apart we have nothing to offer a pagan society.
    - 4. If we love one another we have something to offer society.
