 - B. Jesus prayed in the process of choosing His disciples.
 - 1. You have to make choices; you can't disciple everyone.
 - 2. Would your disciples ever find you on your knees?
 - 3. Stop asking people to do you a favor, ask them to join a fellowship.
 - a) I would never ask my students to do for me what I unashamedly ask them to do for Christ.
 - b) We beg people to do things. Perhaps we should be telling them to go home sometimes.
 - c) Do you choose disciples because of what they can do for you or what you can do for them?
 - C. The principle of exposure.
