I. In II Timothy, Paul calls Timothy to:

- II. Paul calls Timothy to be diligent in fulfilling the ministry. (II Timothy 4:1-5)
 - A. Paul charges Timothy to preach the word on the basis that God will judge each of us.

(II Timothy 4:1)

- 1. Importance of application of the Word. (II Timothy 3:14)
- 2. Power of the Word. (II Timothy 3:15)
- 3. Diving inspiration of the Word. (II Timothy 3:16)
- 4. Purpose of the Word to equip us for good works. (II Timothy 3:17)
- B. Those who hear the Word shape the teachers. (II Timothy 4:3-4)
 - 1. Evangelicals need to evaluate their churches and preachers on the basis of preaching the Word, not being entertaining.
- C. The work of an evangelist. (II Timothy 4:5)

1. Fellowship without evangelism lacks energy and purpose.

2. Fellowship with evangelism is on the move.

3. Evangelism in the church is not the only ingredient but it is an indispensable ingredient.

4. Evangelism begins by befriending sinners - how many unbelievers call you their friend?

III. Paul calls Timothy to be diligent in keeping the faith. (II Timothy 4:6-8)

A. Paul viewed his death as his last act of worship. (II Timothy 4:6)

B. Paul viewed his death as moving on to better ground. (II Timothy 4:6)

C. Paul has been diligent in the faith and confidently anticipates his reward. (II Timothy 4:7-8)

IV. Paul calls Timothy to be diligent in contending with apostasy. (II Timothy 4:9-22)

A. The price is high because only some people finish well in their walk of faith.

B. Being a finisher requires diligence and discipline.

C. Begins with a note of rejection and ends praising God for His power. (II Timothy 4:16-18)

D. Paul encouraged Himself in the Lord His God just as David did at Ziklag.

E. Paul begins, continues, and ends with grace. (II Timothy 1:2, 2:1, 4:22)
