 - 1. To become a Christian. (John 5:35, II Timothy 3)
 - 2. To walk on the right path. (Psalm 19:11)
 - 3. To get back on the right path. (I John 1:9)
 - B. To keep a person from sin. (Psalm 119:111, Matthew 22:29)
 - C. To grow. (I Peter 2:2, Acts 20:32)
 - D. To help other Christians. (Ephesians 4:29, Luke 24:27)

- III. Objections to Scripture memory.
 - A. Scripture memory takes Scripture out of context.
 - 1. Jesus took Scripture out of context.
 - 2. One can learn the context through Scripture memory. (e.g., John 3:16)
 - B. Why memorize when one can read it? One may not always be able to read a Bible though. (Joshua 1:8)
 - C. It lacks in depth study. However, Scripture memory helps a person to meditate on it anywhere. (Colossians 3:16)
- IV. A practical way to memorizing God's word.
 - A. Write a verse down on a card with the topic and reference on the other side.
 - B. Learn a verse in two or three days, but review it throughout the coming months in order to keep it. Use a review box.
 - C. Get a friend to help check up on you.

D. Watch out for pride—do not count how many verses you know.

L.O.R.D.): I Corinthians 10:31 (glorify), Matthew 22:36-38 (love), John 14:21 (obedience), Philippians 4:4 (rejoice), Colossians 4:12 (intercession), Hebrews 11:6 (faith), I Timothy 4:12 (youth), I Thessalonians 5:18 (thanksgiving), Mark 4:19 (hindrances), Ephesians 4:19 (edification), Luke 6:46 (lordship of Christ), Philippians 2:3-4 (always for others), Ephesians 6:1 (respect for others) and Romans 12:1-2 (dedication).
