 - A. Faith. (I Thessalonians 1:3, Colossians 1:4-5, I Corinthians 13:13, I Thessalonians 3)
 - B. Love. (John 13:34-35)
 - 1. The kingdom way to diversity is following God's love.
 - 2. Grace and truth must be held together. (John 1:17)
 - 3. Love fulfills the law. (Galatians 5:14, Romans 13:8-10, Matthew 7:12, 22:37-39, Galatians 5:6)
 - C. Hope.
 - 1. Hope connects us to the present by anchoring us in the future. (Hebrews 6:19)
 - 2. Hope helps us to be content.
 - 3. Hope connects us to the character of the Triune God. (Isaiah 33:18)
