I. Introduction.

- A. The speaker chose this as a life verse when he was younger.
- B. Being reminded of this later in life, he rededicated his life to the Lord.
- C. We all need to rededicate our lives to the Lord periodically.

II. 1 Corinthians 15:58.

- A. What is the work of the Lord?
 - 1. There are many things Christians do, but they may not be the central work of the Lord.
 - 2. The ministry of reconciliation is the work of the Lord. This means to bring into harmony—it is an up to date and needed concept. (2 Corinthians 5:19)
 - 3. There is division between races, nations, family members and individuals.
- B. The cause of our need is sin—we need harmony with the Lord, others, and inside ourselves.
- C. The nature of reconciliation.
 - 1. Reconciliation is not merely patching things up—it is a radical inner change.
 - 2. The radical change requires a change of mind—repentance. This is admitting wrong done.
 - 3. Reconciliation puts the obligation on us to make peace with others. (Matthew 5)
 - 4. Reconciliation is found in the one who came to make peace—Jesus.
- D. Our ministry and where we belong is in the hard places—where there is division.
- E. The fine print of the contract: be steadfast and unmovable.
 - 1. People do not receive this with their eyes wide open.
 - 2. We are to weigh the costs of surrender to him before we yield anew to him.
 - 3. We are to abound in the work of the Lord because most people are not doing enough.
- F. Our labor in the Lord is not in vain.
