
Essentials of the Navigator Ministry *Lorne Sanny*

II. The Essentials.

- A. The Great Commission. (Matthew 28:19-20, John 20:21, Luke 24)
 - 1. Making disciples, training, teaching, baptizing, etc.
 - 2. Summary.
 - a. Preaching the Good News to those who do not know—evangelism. (1 Timothy 2:4)
 - b. Building up those who do know the gospel—establishing, which involves character. (Colossians 1:28, Galatians 5)



B. Specialization.

- 1. Everyone is to be in the business of equipping, but there is diversity in this. (1 Peter 4:10-11
- 2. Equipping is necessary if one is going to train leaders who reproduce. (Acts 16:1)
 - a. This is more than making disciples because included is an ability to pass on of the disciple making process.

- b. The trick is to make disciples and get others to do it.
- 3. Establishing is the process of maturing believers in character. Equipping is the process of preparing believers for a skill.
- 4. The Navigators differ from a local congregation in intent (they are transitory and not permanent), function (they are specialized) and form.

B. Evangelism.

- 1. This requires contact with God and contact with people.
- 2. This requires prayer.
- 3. This requires looking for an opportunity to serve.

C. Establishing.

- 1. God establishes through circumstances and suffering.
- 2. Establishing can come through other believers.
- 3. Establishing comes through the believer himself.
- 4. The minimum requirements for establishing others in the faith is prayer and loving fellowship.

D. Equipping.

- 1. The overall aim is producing a man who makes his unique contribution to the body of Christ.
- 2. Involvement is the key word in equipping.
