I. Introduction.

A. Luke 9:18-27.

B. The Bible teaches that Christ is Lord right away - there is no distinction between Savior and Lord.

II. The gospel.

A. The gospel is the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 15:1-3, Colossians 2:9-10)

B. The good news is that we have been forgiven for our sins. Christ paid the price for the sins of the whole world. (1 Peter 3:18)

C. The Holy Spirit came down at Pentecost and restrains the world from all hell today. (1 Thessalonians 2:7)

D. The Spirit is also in us if we believe. The Spirit is the spirit of Jesus. (1 Corinthians 12:13, Galatians 2:20, John 14-16)

E. We were saved from the penalty of sin, we are being saved from the power of sin, and we will be saved from the presence of sin. (Philippians 3:20-21, 2 Corinthians 4:16)
