- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Ephesians 1:1-23.
 - B. Ephesians is one of the great epistles of the Bible.
 - C. Structure of Ephesians.
 - 1. Theme: Faith.
 - 2. The structure of faith: facts and feelings. (Ephesians 1)
 - 3. The possibility of faith: from death to life, from hostility to faith, from loneliness to love. (Ephesians 2)
 - 4. The function of faith: the mystery explained, the mystery described, the mystery demonstrated. (Ephesians 3)
 - 5. The practical section: the community of faith described, seen in action and applied. (Ephesians 4)
 - 6. The walk of faith: in a sex-mad world, in a Spirit-filled church, in a Christ-honoring home. (Ephesians 5)
 - 7. The fight of faith: the armor of God, the activity of battle, and the undefeatable posture. (Ephesians 6)
- II. The salutation of the letter and background.
 - A. It was written in Rome in 61 AD.
 - B. It was written to the Ephesians but likely was a circular letter only starting with the city.
 - C. Paul's authority was confirmed by the Apostles based upon his gospel.
 - D. Saints are those marked as different and faithful in Christ—not those who are austere.
 - E. God's grace and peace make us charming and lovely people—the Christian ought to be constantly characterized by these.
- III. Paul starts with what God has already done for us—the strength of the Christian faith.
- IV. Seven facts upon which the Christian faith rests.
 - A. Background.

- 1. The enrichments are for blessing. The church was changed from a wicked background. (I Corinthians 6)
- 2. We find these blessings in the inner spiritual life.
- B. We were chosen by the Father before time and destined by the Father to be His sons.
- C. We were reborn in the Father.
- D. We have been redeemed by the process of forgiveness in Christ.
 - 1. God is in the process of continually giving us forgiveness.
 - 2. The Christian starts from a place of God's love—it is from this that we get a sense of worth.
- E. In the Son, we have the mystery of God's will.
- F. In the Son, you have been destined and appointed to live for the glory of God.
- G. In the Spirit, we receive truth.
- H. We have the seal of the Holy Spirit assuring our salvation and showing that we are believers. (Romans 8)
- V. Our feelings about the facts of faith.
 - A. Background.
 - 1. Our feelings are okay.
 - 2. We need to learn to distrust our feelings until they can be substantiated by God.
 - 3. Feeling must follow from fact.
 - 4. Teaching must be accompanied by prayer that the mind grasped will also move the heart—emotions will be stirred by the truth.
 - 5. God wants no dull and unresponsive Christians.
 - 6. Decisions cannot be made by the mind or the heart by itself.
 - B. The feelings Paul wants to arouse.
 - 1. Hope of what is to come
 - 2. Hope of the inheritance, which is God Himself.
 - 3. Hope in the knowledge of the resurrection power of Jesus Christ—God uses the very power of the opposition and uses it against the opposition. (Ephesians 6)
