## Concept of God

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- I. Introduction: Hebrews 1:1-3.
- II. The reality of God.
  - A. In the beginning—God.
    - 1. The Bible does not prove God but assumes God.
    - 2. It invites us to experience God instead.
    - 3. In the difficult times we can become more certain of his reality and grace than any other time.
  - B. Never doubt in the light what God has shown you in the dark.
  - C. A hero is one who has penetrated through to ultimate reality and who gives himself to that reality without reservation and in sincerity and humility.
    - 1. We are far too attached to what is not ultimate reality.
    - 2. For Moses, God was ultimate reality.
    - 3. Abraham was strong in faith and gave glory to God being persuaded that God was able to perform what He said. (Romans 4:20)
    - 4. David was made a hero before slaying Goliath. He was hooked into ultimate reality.
    - 5. Paul believed God. (Acts 27:25)
    - 6. Dawson Trotman was a man of destiny.
- II. The communication of God.
  - A. One of the greatest facts of the Universe is that God has spoken and is speaking. (Hebrews 1)
    - 1. He has done this through nature, through conscience and the Prophets recorded in the Scriptures. (Romans 1)
    - 2. The maker of the universe has spoken.
    - 3. In the last days he has spoken to us through a Son. If you want to know what God is like look at Jesus Christ.
    - 4. God is with us.

- 5. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom and it is to be chosen. (Proverbs 1:21, 29)
- 6. We should long to know God better and to put Him first in our lives.
- B. The twin foundations of Evangelicalism: the Person of Christ and the Scriptures. (Ephesians 2:20)
  - 1. The Christian is under authority. (John 13:13)
  - 2. Christ is our authority, and He regarded the Scriptures as authority.
  - 3. Christ invested the Apostles with authority.
  - 4. The authority of Scripture is due to the inspiration of Scripture.
  - 5. The Scripture's authority and Christ's authority stand and fall together.
    - a. The authority of the Scripture: it is something that will not change.
    - b. Jesus' authority: He was revealing God, revealing God's love, destroying the works of the Devil, giving us an example, bearing witness to the truth and by Himself was purging our sins.
      - 1) On the basis of Christ's death can we have a clean conscience and fellowship.
      - 2) Christ is interceding for us in heaven as one who can sympathize with us. Christ feels like we feel because He is a man. Therefore also His judgment will be fair.
- III. Conclusion: may our knowledge of God be the foundation.
