 - 2. Nehemiah knew what to do and why.
 - 3. Liberty was left for the how.
 - 4. When you get a clear vision for your purpose in ministry, write it down.
 - B. Faith to see that it can be done.
 - 1. Nehemiah's faith was rooted in Scripture.
 - 2. It helps to have a purpose rooted in Scripture. This becomes an anchor and helps to bring vision and faith to others. (Romans 10:17)
 - C Perseverance to see it done. (Joshua 1)
 - 1. Let the people know that God that God is with you, which means you are to be with God. This is the quiet time for us. (2 Chronicles 15:2)
 - a. Biblical leadership begins with the quiet time.
 - b. The speaker prays his day forward as an example
 - 5. Take the lead.
 - 6. Be of good courage.
 - a. This involves character.
 - b. Success is never final, and failure is never fatal. It is courage that counts. (Churchill)
 - c. Thank God that He will see you through the problems. (James 1)
 - d. Courage is the mental willingness to endure.
