The Art of Personal Witnessing - Part 3 Lorne Sanny

I. Part 1.

A. Introduction.

- 1. Preparation is a necessity.
- 2. Fruit in the Christian life is a result of first taking root. (Isaiah 37:31)
- 3. One takes root by:
 - a. Getting into the Bible and gaining a working knowledge of it.
 - b. Having a personal time with Jesus Christ.
 - c. Depending upon the Holy Spirit for power.

B. The approach.

- 1. Get going—go to the people. (Mark 16:15, Exodus 4:12, John 1:41-45)
- 2. This will require giving up some Christian fellowship in order to be with the lost.
- 3. You must know and study the Lord and the person from whom you are trying to get an opportunity from to share Jesus.
 - a. You do not have to know all the answers.
 - b. You gain confidence by being interested in what the person is interested in.
 - c. You can also use honest and sincere commendation.
 - d. Use service to win a hearing for the gospel too.
 - e. A simple testimony is a powerful tool for sharing the gospel. (Psalm 107:2)

II. Part 2.

A. Introduction.

- 1. Subject: telling the story.
- 2. Review.

B. Getting an opening.

1. There is no formula, but only some suggestions.

- 2. Use an appropriate, tasteful gospel track. Say, "Here is something I'd like you to look at. Read it over and I'd like to hear what you think."
- 3. Simply ask permission to share something important to you.
- 4. Witnessing is simply taking a good look at the Lord Jesus and sharing what you have seen.
- 5. Always be courteous. (2 Timothy 2:24)
- 6. We should be straight to the point and not be devious.
- 7. Stick to the point.
- C. Do's and Don't s in telling the story.
 - 1. Do not presuppose a negative response.
 - 2. Do bring them face to face with Jesus Christ Himself.
 - 3. Do use your Bible to show them what God has to say.
 - 4. Do not try to force a person.
 - 5. Never argue.
 - 6. Keep it simple.
 - 7. Make sure you share the gospel—this is a certain body of facts. (1 Corinthians 15:3-4)
- D. Be sure you tell the true gospel story.

III. Part 3.

A. Introduction.

- 1. The need for the gospel—spiritual blindness and death. (2 Corinthians 4, Acts 26:18, Ephesians 2:1)
- 2. The only remedy is the gospel. The gospel is essential in salvation and must be preached in evangelism. (Romans 1)
- 3. It must be spoken in power and simplicity.
- B. Gospel defined. (1 Corinthians 15:3-4)
 - 1. Essential facts: Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, was buried and rose on the third day according to the Scriptures.
 - 2. The approach will vary.

- 3. Four point outline.
 - a. The fact of sin. This includes every individual. (Romans 3:23)
 - b. The penalty of sin is death. (Romans 6:23)
 - c. Jesus Christ paid the penalty for our sin. (Romans 5:8)
 - 1) Only Christ, a perfect Person, could pay for our sins since He had none of His own.
 - 2) Further, only Christ could pay for every person's sin because of His supreme worth as God. (1 Peter 2:24)
 - d. We must receive and accept this personally to benefit from it.
 - 1) We receive Christ as our own personal Savior. (John 1:12)
 - 2) We repent from our sin, which is changing our mind about our sin and about God.
 - 3) Christ promises that if we receive Him in our hearts He will come in to us. (Revelation 3:20)

IV. Part 4.

- A. Introduction.
 - 1. Subject: the caring for the new Christian.
 - 2. A new Christian needs help immediately.
- B. Contents to cover.
 - 1. Assurance of salvation.
 - a. Satan uses doubt.
 - b. People allow a doubt to come in because they trust in feelings that are an unsafe guide.
 - c. People also allow doubt to come in because they fail to realize one can have absolute assurance. (1 John 5:11-12, Revelation 3:20)
 - 1) If you have the Son, you have life.
 - 2) Christ is waiting to be invited in; His promise is that He will come in once invited. Assurance rests on the promises of the Scriptures.
 - 2. Follow up immediately.

- a. A new Christian needs a spiritual parent. (1 Corinthians 4:15)
- b. A new Christian needs to be cared for and trained immediately as a baby.
- c. Satan immediately attacks with doubt.
