 - 3. Nathan had to approach David subtly through a parable to convict him.

 - A. Pray for forgiveness.
 - 1. This is the need for mercy.
 - 2. There is a need for the debt to be blotted out.
 - 3. There is a need for cleansing—sin is like a stain upon the soul.
 - B. The basis for forgiveness.
 - 1. God's steadfast love.
 - 2. God's abundant mercies.
 - C. Sin must always be acknowledged—it is an insult and injury to God.

- A. A request for wisdom—the truth about oneself regarding one's fallen-ness.
- B. A request for purging with hyssop—the evil must be cleansed.
- C. A request for truth for joy.
- D. A request for blotting out guilt.
- E. A request for a new heart.
- F. A request for the assurance of the Holy Spirit. (Hebrews 13)
- G. A request for the will to do God's will.
