## The Potter and the Clay Ray Stedman

I. Introduction.
A. Text: Jeremiah 18-19.
B. America is increasingly a nation that is being thrown into hell because of its godlessness.
C. Jeremiah demonstrates the judgment of God.
D. Jeremiah is shown the depravity of man but also the hope that is in God. (I Chronicles 7:14)
II. The picture of the potter and the clay.
A. People are the clay.
B. The wheel represents the revolving circumstances of life.
C. The potter is God who has the right to shape the clay as He desires. (Romans 9)
1. Jeremiah learned of God's sovereignty through this picture.
2. God does not like to judge—He "sighs" when he must bring pressure to shape the clay.
III. The people's response to Jeremiah's prophesy drives Jeremiah back to God in prayer. Even a prophet of God has his times of weakness and fear.
IV. God is sovereign over His people.
A. Man makes plans, but God makes other plans.
B. The great lesson is that God sometimes has to break a person down in order to change him into a vessel of honor.

1. When has God had to break you down in order to teach you a lesson? What did you learn?
2. Does God show His love when He brings pressure to shape a person? Explain.

3. When have you experienced a group of people responding negatively to needed criticism? How
can we gain strength in delivering God's message even when people may not want to hear it?
