- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: I John 3:11-18.
 - B. The world is engulfed by hate.
- II. The intertwining of love and hate.
 - A. The origin of hate.
 - 1. Only God is capable of love—love originates outside of man.
 - 2. Hate also originates outside of man—it comes from Satan.
 - B. Hate is really love twisted. The devil diverts and twists the life of God.
 - 1. Anyone who hates is of the evil one.
 - 2. Judas fell into the grip of hate as well as Ananias and Sapphira.
 - 3. Hatred bursts to the surface because this is the nature of the evil one from whom it comes.
- III. The nature of hate.
 - A. The best that can come of it is indifference.
 - B. It disguises itself under other names.
 - C. The reasons for anger—why did Cain murder Able?
 - 1. Able offered his gift by faith in obedience to what God had asked.
 - 2. Cain did not offer his sacrifice by faith—he devised his own religion.
 - 3. Cain fell into hatred because he fell into a fanciful sense of injustice.
 - D. Hate is directed at a human object, but it is always an attack upon God.
 - E. The outcome of hate is murder. If the circumstances were right, a hateful person would murder only being kept by reprisal from man and God.
 - F. When a Christian hates it reveals that eternal life is no longer abiding in him—he slips temporarily back into the control of the devil.
- IV. The answer to hate.

- A. There is no answer outside the power of God through the cross of Christ.
- B. We must seize the hate, confess it and receive the answering power of love from the Son of God in our hearts.
