Smyrna and Pergamum: A Pressured Church and a Compromising Church Ray Stedman

- I. Introduction. Text: Revelation 2:8-17.
- II. Smyrna.
 - A. It was tough to live as a Christian in Smyrna because they had to live between two extremes—the warm fellowship within the church and the hostility without of the church.
 - B. Christ revealed Himself to Smyrna as the Lord of the extremes.
 - C. The Lord knew their afflictions.
 - D. The Lord knew their poverty.
 - 1. Riches and fame do not make one happy.
 - 2. True riches are those that come from within.
 - E. Slander came from the Jews.
 - 1. It is difficult to stand up under slander.
 - 2. We are not to be afraid of what we are to suffer—the devil will even put some in prison.
 - 3. Limitations are placed on testing.
 - F. If one trusts Jesus in times of conflict and persecution, he can trust that he will never have to face the judgment of God.

III. Pergamum.

- A. This church is faced with enticement and corruption.
- B. The Word of God comes from Jesus' lips cutting the mind and the emotions, awakening the believer to reality.
- C. That Jesus is both God and man is orthodox doctrine—Pergamum held to this truth to the cost of their own lives.
- D. However, they were exposing themselves to immorality and priestly superiority.
- E. The solution for this is the Word of God.
- F. Jesus is food for the inner Spirit.
