- I. Introduction. Text: Revelation 3.
- II. The condition of the church of Sardis.
 - A. There was nothing attractive about the church here.
 - B. The life of the church is revealed in its deeds.
 - 1. The church outwardly professed Christ.
 - 2. However, there was no life in the churches.
 - C. Disciples must be cross bearers who discipline themselves instead of escape life.
 - D. There must have been a time when this church was alive.
- III. The need of Sardis.
 - A. They needed to wake up.
 - B. They were to strengthen what remains.
 - 1. This refers to their works.
 - 2. Their works were good in a way, but they were incomplete.
 - 3. They were to be strengthened by getting the motives right.
 - C. They needed to remember how they received the gospel.
 - 1. Repentance brings about conversion and allows the Spirit to bring about the life of Christ.
 - 2. This is the place of new beginning.
 - D. They needed to remember the hope of the coming of the Lord.
 - 1. Jesus will come suddenly and without warning.
 - 2. Jesus will take the church suddenly in the air. (I Corinthians 15)
- IV. There is a period in church history marked by Sardis conditions following the Reformation.
 - A. The reformers preached the truth of the gospel.

- B. The mistake of the reformers was that they linked the oversight of the church with government control.
- C. God protects those who have received the life of Christ by faith. (Isaiah 1:18)
 - 1. The overcomers will be dressed in white before the throne of God.
 - 2. God will never blot out their names from the book of life—God gives reassurance to those who believe.
 - 3. Believers will be acknowledged before all.
