1. The leader will have great authority and the appearance of great power.

A. What happens here is an answer to the prayers of the saints.

B. The saints pray for the avenging of the blood of the saints whose lives have been taken on earth.

C. The answer takes the form of releasing four fallen angels.

D. This is the first glimpse we have of the campaign of Armageddon.

A. The idols do nothing, but the age imagines that they do.

B. Even under these terrible judgments people do not change their ways.

C. God does not expect to convert the world through judgment—He wants to use it to get us to listen to grace.
