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- A. Text: I Peter 1:3.
- B. I Peter captures the glory of Easter.
- II. The resurrection of Jesus is designed to help us in our difficult moments.
 - A. If Jesus is not able to meet our needs, as He was those in the first century, then Christianity is a fraud.
 - B. Near-death experiences are questionable because death is the total absence of bodily function. These experiences leave us with a very subjective hope.
 - C. The Christian hope is not subjective.
 - 1. Believers are given the assurance that they will not be alone in the hour of death.
 - 2. We need have no fear about death—there is no ground for fear.
 - 3. Beyond this life is the promise of greater functioning than we have ever known on earth.
 - a. The resurrection of Jesus was different from other resurrections.
 - b. He would not die again, and He came back with a different glorified body.
 - D. The promises of the resurrection can be applied to every area of life.
 - 1. Jesus brings peace in the present.
 - 2. When Christ is in one's heart, a person has the power to do things he never thought he could.
 - 3. Christ is alive—He is ready to meet us in the problem of death, but also in the dilemmas of life.
