I. The infinite God.

- A. If He had any defect:
 - 1. He would not be worthy of worship.
 - 2. He would not be our God.
 - 3. He must be infinite in all that He is.
- B. When we think about God in anything, we must think of Him infinitely.
- C. The god that is worshipped in many places is not the infinite God, but something short of that.
 - 1. Even modern Christianity falls short we think of a God that is short of what He is.
 - 2. We have to think of God as being the Perfect One.
- II. God takes pleasure in Himself and rejoices in His own perfections.
 - A. The Trinity is glad in Himself.
 - B. God delights in His work.
 - 1. He made what He did joyfully.
 - 2. He took pleasure on the perfection of His work.
 - 3. Redemption was based upon the happy willingness of God.
 - C. God delights in Himself; the Son in the Father, the Father in the Son, and the Holy Spirit too.
 - D. The Incarnation was a joyous voluntary act.
 - E. Jesus saves rejoicing.
 - F. All creation is God's joyous work.
 - 1. Creation is more than science.
 - 2. Creation is more than an accident.
